



The Minister writes:

For the last few years, the March magazine has been published as we begin Lent. Once again we have an opportunity to use this month as a preparation for the great festival of Easter.



Lent can be seen as a time for growth. Not just growth for the sake of it, but growth into the likeness of Christ. It is all too easy to become complacent and stuck in our ways, so often we need some sort of jolt to change. This can make growth uncomfortable even painful.

Traditionally, Lent has been a time of giving things up, and that can be helpful. The act of self discipline is helpful in itself. The idea of growth is a very positive one, particularly as it is also Spring time when we are beginning to see signs of growth around us. While this growth happens spontaneously in nature, we can do things in our garden to help. Cutting back plants is a way of encouraging growth, as is digging out weeds and spreading fertiliser. In our spiritual life there are many ways of applying these principles. Cutting back can give us a positive reason for giving things up. It is all too easy to fill our lives with business. Jesus was particularly good at spending time in prayer so he knew what to say no to. So maybe giving up a TV programme could be helpful if we used the time to enrich ourselves in other ways.

This could take a number of forms: taking time to read the Bible and pray; deciding to spend time with neighbours or friends; or choosing to care for someone perhaps with a phone call or writing a letter. The digging up of weeds can also be a picture of cutting out things in our life that are not helpful. This means taking time to discern the areas of our lives that leave us more desolate or diminished. This might be just stopping things or it could lead to the whole area of confession. Confession then becomes a positive experience as the fault is faced up to and dealt with by decisively turning away from it. By God's grace we are then set free from the consequences.

Let this Lent be a time for growth, as we ask the Holy Spirit to make us restless till we change, and prepare for the glorious celebration of Easter. *Rev Bill Henderson*

Stanley Surgery News

After 25 happy years, Dr Janice Woodrow is retiring from the partnership at Stanley Surgery.

Patients are welcome to drop in to the surgery waiting room to say goodbye to Dr Woodrow on Wednesday 20th March between 1pm-3pm. She will be greatly missed by the whole community and everyone is warmly invited to call in on this day to offer their best wishes. From April, Dr Fasae will be welcomed to the practice; he has been providing locum cover for the past few months and so will already be familiar to many.

The practice premises will be undergoing major refurbishment and extension starting on 1st April 2013. This will be a 9 month project which will give increased consulting room space and improved facilities. Parking at the surgery will be temporarily disrupted but arrangements have been made with The Travellers, opposite, who are kindly providing alternative parking space for patients during this period. Bill's visit to Africa

Last summer, Bill spent seven weeks visiting various place in Africa as part of his three month sabbatical.

The first part of Bill's visit was in Kisumu, Kenya, where he spent time seeing how his daughter's project is progressing. Suzy set up a women's health initiative which has already helped thousands of women in rural areas. Kisumu is on the edge of Lake Victoria and is a sizeable town with roadside stalls selling fruit, vegetables and barrels of water. While in Kisumu, Bill met up with Rosalia who introduced him to her church in a slum area of the town. He went to one of the church services there and was amused by the fact that there was no one there at the beginning of the service; everyone waits until the singing starts! He was also impressed with how even the houses in the slum areas are very well kept.

From Kisumu, he travelled across the border to Kampala, in Uganda to stay with a family who run a game lodge. While there, he went on a horse safari, the highlight of which was cantering among a herd of zebra! Throughout his trip, he was struck by the gulf that can sometimes exist between rich and poor: the slum areas and the luxury safari lodges. There are huge plantations of rice, tea and sugar cane, but they are owned by big companies who take the money away from the local communities.

Back in Kenya, Bill met up with Florence, a community worker who set up a project to care for the many orphans in her locality, with agreement and support from everyone else in her neighbourhood. He then embarked on the long journey by small plane across to Juba, in South Sudan. He flew with Mission Aviation Fellowship, a Christian organisation that flies into remote areas, helping to transport medical and church workers, and that begins every journey with a prayer!

From Juba, he travelled to Mundri, where he and Viv lived for several years in the late 1980's. The area around Juba and Mundri is heavily forested and sparsely populated. There are isolated areas where people have settled and cleared the land to cultivate the crops. In rural

Africa it is essential to be able to farm the land; if you don't grow your own crops, you will starve. Cattle are increasingly becoming a problem for farmers. Cattle herders from the north have moved south and there is much conflict when they allow their animals to trespass on to farm land.

A highlight of Bill's visit was meeting up with old friends. Bismark was a young man at the Bible College twenty years ago, and is now the Bishop of Mundri. Bill did some teaching at the Bible college while he was there and was struck by how much communications have improved. Mobile phone technology has really taken off but it is still difficult to get phones charged. Some initiatives encourage people to make their own windmills with locally sourced materials which power the batteries to charge phones. Bill took with him two solarpowered battery packs to give as gifts: they were very gratefully received. Bill was also reunited with Zilipa, the lady who looked after his eldest daughter twenty years ago, and Keliona, his assistant.

Back in Kenya, Bill then embarked on the long overland journey south to the Tanzanian border. He spent a very busy time in the Mara region seeing the work that the Water for Life project has done in the area, by building wells of various designs for the rural villages. Local gold mining has contaminated some drinking sources with mercury and there is still a problem with mending and maintaining wells.

He visited Musoma, the capital of the Mara region, and also the areas of Tarime and Rorya where he did some more Bible teaching. In the EAST Sudan village of Sakawa, with which St Peter's is linked, Bill was reunited with Uganda Rose and Samuel Kayus whom he met on a Rwanda previous visit. Since returning to the UK, Bill has been

invited by the Water for Life project to return to Tanzania in May for several weeks to help with discussions about how the project might be extended.

<u>The Early Years Unit</u>'s topic is 'People who help us' and are focussing on firemen. They are making fire engine models, and also reading the Easter story and working on an enterprise project.

<u>Class 1</u> is learning about the jungle. In science, they are looking at sound and hearing and are making their own musical instruments.

<u>Class 2</u> are studying the Katie Morag books and learning about islands. They're making clay sculptures of lighthouses, writing postcards, and are also reading Bible stories.

<u>Class 3</u> is studying the weather: they are writing weather poetry, looking at weather maps and learning about the water cycle. In Art, they are learning about artists such as Monet and Van Gogh and their different techniques.

<u>Class 4's</u> topic is Anglo Saxons. They learning about different societies and historical events; they are reading diary extracts and doing some weaving.

<u>Class 5</u> is learning about the Tudors: how they lived, the difference between rich and poor, and will be looking at Tudor portraits. They are also going on a school trip to the Royal Armouries in Leeds to help with their topic work.

The whole school is studying the Seals topic: 'Good to be me' and we have enjoyed some excellent class assemblies when the different classes have taken turns to tell the rest of the school and the parents about their class work.

The school council is organising a number of events to support and celebrate Red Nose Day on Friday 15th March. The children will be encouraged to share jokes and funny stories and everyone is invited to wear something red and help raise some money.

On Thursday 21st March, from 3:30m—4:30pm our Early Years Unit will be holding an open evening for prospective new families. Please come along and have a look around our unit and the main school and meet the staff.




